


BELIEVE AND ACHIEVE


Belief in oneself is catching: our teachers, therapists, and staff believe their students can learn, and the students

The celebration in November marking Pathways-Crossland's 10th Anniversary included words of commendation and gratitude, dance and poetry performances, and a meal catered by the Crossland High School Culinary Arts Academy. Maryland State Delegate Tony Knotts was recognized by Pathways for his support and in response shared words of thanks and advice for



students. Sherri Smith from the Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) Nonpublic Office accepted an award on behalf of Belinda Gantt, Nonpublic Supervisor. The award recognized Pathways' partnership with PGCPS both in opening the first Type II school located in a public school in Maryland more than 25 years ago and in following that success by opening another at Crossland High School in 2005.




Tuition Revenue Sources for year ending June 30, 2016

Pathways Mission: *To enable our students to acquire the skills they need to succeed in school, career and life through individualized education and supports.*

Academics


*P*athways mission to enable our students to acquire the skills they need to succeed in school is linked to a program of individualized education that supports academic achievement. Our teachers use a range of strategies and technologies to make it possible for our students to learn at their highest potential. This year, for example, Pathways made strides in further incorporating technology into the educational environment and opening new learning frontiers for our students. Our partnership with Microsoft expanded, with students from every site visiting the lead store in Bethesda for training in computer and IT skills. The year culminated with a career day at the Microsoft corporate office in Chevy Chase, during which students listened to a panel discussing careers in computer technology. The Microsoft partnership has an affinity with Pathways Young Entrepreneurship Program (YEP); and this year Microsoft sponsored the YEP award luncheon.

*T*he Pathways Board of Directors facilitated a proposal to obtain Chromebook laptop computers for teacher and student use at all Pathways sites. The Chromebooks use web-based applications which became significant tools for research, writing assignments, powerpoint presentations, and more, all of which could be assigned, completed, and submitted online. Students were able to access educational websites with classes from MIT, Harvard, Stanford and other major universities. Students even received therapy services through the use of the webcams and microphone headsets. The Chromebooks were particularly innovative in our community-based program, as they could be used in a variety of settings, providing educational technology anywhere it was needed.



Transition

A comprehensive education prepares students for lifelong learning, economic independence, and responsible citizenship. Pathways transition program continued to offer a variety of experiences and support necessary to enable students to succeed after graduation. Pathways' partnership with the City of Greenbelt expanded to include vocational training in auto maintenance. Four students from three sites worked with a professional auto technician and were supervised by a master mechanic and maintained the city's vehicles in the garage at the Department of Public Works.



*P*athways supported other students pursuing both college and a variety of career options. This year two of them, both at Crossland Re-Entry, stood out: Kemari Greene received her ServSafe Certification and is employed in a local restaurant. Shanazia Thompson excelled at AP English and other classes while completing the Nursing Assistant curriculum and sitting for the certification exam. She was accepted into multiple colleges, including Morgan State and Montgomery College. She will decide which program is best for her to pursue her interest in a career in the health and medical field.



Therapy

*P*athways schools are therapeutic environments in which each student's needs are met on an individual basis in a success-oriented approach that builds on strengths and bolsters hope. Individual and group therapy is enhanced by a creative range of artistic and recreational therapies that are motivational, fun, and effective both academically and emotionally. Four artists carried out week-long residencies in all six of our school-programs. The residencies used rap, mosaic, mural arts and fabric art to teach cultural diversity, social studies, poetry, and more while encouraging self-expression and respect. In turn, the residencies produced some stunning artwork, including an amazing three-dimensional mural in honor of the ten years of Pathways success at Crossland High School. Many of these creations were on display at the Annual Student Art Show in April.
